



AutoCAD [Mac/Win] (Latest)

The AutoCAD logo has changed three times in the history of the software. In the first version, published in December 1982, the image of a building with a revolving crane was designed by Ed Fincher, who also designed the logo for Microsoft's famous Windows software package. In 1988, the image of an aerial view of the City of New York was designed by Dan D'allera, who is now known as the author of the AutoCAD style guide. In 2008, the logo changed again, this time with the addition of the word Autodesk. Today, the software is bundled with the software name "AutoCAD." AutoCAD was originally created by John Walker, who joined Autodesk in 1980, as a feature of the 3D architectural software program, VisiCalc. AutoCAD supports the following basic functions: Drawing: design objects and edit their properties Creating views: construct drawings and design elements from the entities or objects Modeling: create objects with geometrical properties such as area, perimeter and volume Creating technical drawings: represent the construction of buildings, machinery, vehicles and so on Editing: modify drawings and model entities Viewing: manipulate the construction of drawings Using annotations: insert, edit and delete annotations Tool-slicing: cut, trim, clip and otherwise manipulate design entities Saving the drawing as a file Display: display the information contained in the drawing Tracing: create a drawing by importing entities, views, commands, annotations and so on Version 2: Release 2: AutoCAD and AutoCAD LT 2.0 The AutoCAD 2.0 software was released in May 1987. This version featured a radical redesign and brought together many of the features that were previously present in separate products such as AutoCAD and Eagle Cadd. This version of AutoCAD was also the first release of AutoCAD that was available as a desktop application. The new release also introduced a command line, non-graphical user interface (GUI). AutoCAD LT 2.0, which was also released in May 1987, was available as a desktop and a network version. The LT was developed in a single-user mode; other customers could not use it without a license. It was also one of the first releases to support the B-Rep or "bi-component" architectural

An Explorer object is a user interface object used to select objects for manipulation and display by a script. Both AutoCAD and AutoCAD LT include many drawing macros to automate common tasks. Drawing macros are similar to Microsoft Visual Basic for Applications (VBA) macros, but are built directly into the application. These can be used either as stand-alone applications, or can be bundled with other AutoCAD applications. For example, a macro can be created to automatically generate object dimensions from a length-to-width ratio. Since AutoCAD 2010, AutoCAD can be used as a form of mobile device, which can be used to enter data or run applications on the mobile device. This version of AutoCAD has been released under the common Open Architecture License. History AutoCAD was originally developed as AutoCAD Drafting and CAD Manager in 1989. The name was later changed to AutoCAD for Small to Medium Business (AutoCAD for SMB) in 1990. AutoCAD LT was originally released in 2000. In 2006, Autodesk split the product into two separate applications. A follow-up, AutoCAD LT 2017, was released in 2010. AutoCAD was originally developed under the name of Freehand for drafting and was later released as Autodesk Freehand in 1997. On 16 November 2017, Autodesk released a new AutoCAD version called AutoCAD LT 2019 (formerly AutoCAD for Small and Medium Business).
